Tartars End Play With Scheduled Tilt Against Inglewood Tomorrow Eve

Torrance High School's dismal 1958 Bay League basketball season comes to an end tomorrow night at Inglewood when the lowly Tartars will try to bow out with an even 5-5 record by dumping the Sentinels on their own floor. Game time is 8 p.m. following the junior-varsity preliminary.

In the first round of league play the Sents' lead by their jumping jack 6' 5" forward, Gary Cunningham, hung a loss on the THSers and Coach Marty Pelka's cagers will be out to reverse the decision. If the Tartars can do it, they'll even up their record at 5-5, with wins over Mira Costa, Santa Monica, and twice over Leuzinger. In Tuesday's 78-54 drubbing from Redondo's Maroon and Gray weren't the same team that had earlier toppled Santa Monica and Leuzinger in overtimes.

Russ Vanderpool and Gene Crenshaw were high scorers for the locals Tuesday, each sending 16 to 14 points respectively through the hoop. Celebrated Star With Redondo's celebrated junior scoring star tallying 25 for the winners, the Seahawks moved into the league's number two position in total scoring with 187 points, six ahead of Crenshaw. It was the second straight time the Tartars had been beaten by the Red and White, and now the Seahawks are possible contenders for second place and a CIF playoff berth if they can stop Santa Monica tomorrow.

Inglewood, an unpredictable outfit that has given everyone trouble, will be banking on Cunningham, the league's top scorer, with over 200 points, to lead the Green and white to their fifth victory of the Bay League season.

ORDINANCE NO. 939
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA, ENTITLED "LICENSING AND REGULATION OF BUSINESS AND TRADES TO PROVIDE THAT ATTENDANTS MUST BE ON DUTY AT ALL TIMES IN SELF-SERVICE LAUNDRIES AND ESTABLISHMENTS FOR THE REASON THEREOF AND DECLARING THE PRESENCE OF AN EMERGENCY; AND SUBSTITUTING THEREFOR ARTICLE OF CHAPTER 16 RELATING TO THE SAME SUBJECT."

That Ordinance No. 928 entitled "Sections 16.02 and 16.03 of the Code of the City of Torrance, 1954" with Sections 16.20, 16.21 and 16.22 to read in their entirety as follows:

Section 16.02. Attendants required at self-service laundries. All self-service laundries shall have an attendant on duty at all times during the hours of operation thereof. Such attendant shall be at least twenty-one years of age and shall have the physical and mental ability to effectively operate the machines used therein.

Section 16.20. Definition of self-service laundry. Self-service laundry shall mean any laundry where the majority of the manual operations are performed by the customers.

Section 16.22. License fee required. A license fee shall be paid for each self-service laundry in the amount of twenty-five dollars per year plus an additional fee for each coin-operated machine therein in an amount as specified for coin-operated machines in section 16.60.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA, ENTITLED "LICENSING AND REGULATION OF BUSINESS AND TRADES TO PROVIDE THAT ATTENDANTS MUST BE ON DUTY AT ALL TIMES IN SELF-SERVICE LAUNDRIES AND ESTABLISHMENTS FOR THE REASON THEREOF" is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Any provision of the Torrance City Code, or appendices thereto inconsistent herewith, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further are hereby repealed.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or six (6) months in the County Jail of Los Angeles County, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 4.
This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after the date of its adoption and prior to the expiration of fifteen days from the passage thereof shall be published at least once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in the City of Torrance.
