Driving on the wrong side of the road is fast becoming a major problem on California highways according to information released today by the

mation released today by the California Highway Patrol. "Each year an increasing number of drivers are in-volved in accidents while driv-ing on the wrong side of the road," declared Patrol Com-missioner B. R. Caldwell. "Dur-ing 1956 a study of 'wrong side of the road' accidents revealed that there was one fatal acci-

of the road' accidents revealed that there was one fatal acci-dent for every 11 injury acci-dents in that classification. "A similar study of all fatal and injury accidents for the same year shows that there was one fatal accident for every 27 injury accidents, indicating that driving on the the wrong side the road is one of our more deadly violations," Cald-well stated. "Some of the causes of drivers drifting across the center line are ex-cessive speed on curves, asleep cessive speed on curves, asleep at the wheel, under the in-fluence of alcohol, fatigue,

and failure to keep alert. "Keeping on your side of the road will help you avoid head-on collisions, side-swipe crashes, similar errors by other, drivers, and give you a better chance of completing your trip without an accident," Caldwell said.


