The City Election

(An Editorial)

Voters will go to the polls here Tuesday to decide six city offices, including the membership of a new seven-man city council and its mayor, to be elected by the voters for

Pre-election campaigning has been marked by contrasts-ardent supporters of the principal candidates have been busy working both sides of every street, while a large segment of the city's voting population appears patently unaware that an election is upon them.

Top interest is focused on the race for mayor between Nick Drale, mayor of Torrance during the years 1954-55, and Albert Isen, who succeeded him.

The campaign has been a vigorous one, with Drale and his supporters hammering away at one-man government charges against Isen, while Drale's 10-year record as a councilman has been researched and the slips and errors campaign-Nick Drale and Alread back to him by Isen forces.

Behind the campaign to return Drale to the mayor's office are a number of prominent people including several office are a number of prominent people including several former mayors of Torrance, Dr. Howard A. Wood, last year's "Man of the Year," and other civic leaders who have always been in the vanguard of those advocating progress in Torrance.

Isen has received the endorsement of the Central Labor Council of Wilmington, and has strong backing by many Torrance citizens and groups.

Drale Flays Power Grab In Final Bid

"The time has come when Torrance voters must choose between a representative government and a one-man rule," according to Nick Drale, senior member of the city council and a candidate for mayor.

"We must rature the must."

"We must return the muni-cipal government to the city council where it belongs under the charter," Drale said.

He emphasized that the operations of a one-man govern-ment during the past three years should be evidence enough to the people that "they must act now, if they want to be represented in the decisions of their city govern-ment."

Drale also stressed that "we must return to the department heads of the city those admin-

must return to the department heads of the city those administrative responsibilities which they are charged to perform because of specialized knowledge and as city employes."

Record of Power

In the final days of his campaign to be returned to the post of mayor he held formerly, Drale has hammered away at his opponent's record of power control in the city.

"A long-standing tradition that members of the city council elected by the people share the responsibility of nominating members of the city's boards and commissions was one of the first things tossed overboard by my opponent when he gained control of the council," Drale emphasized.

Since that time, all members of the city's advisory groups have been selected by one man "without regard to the wishes of other members of the council... particularly members of the minority" he added
