Several witnesses testified Friday at the inquest that Terry raced through a church crosswalk, narrowly missing several pedestrians, and then attempted to force pursuing police cars off the road.

Justifiable homicide was the Officer McCrory said he fired who was trapped when his car crashed on Pacific Coast Hwy. near Robert Rd.

"As God is my witness, I did not mean for the boy to die that way," the officer drama-tically told members of Terry's family as he left the stand.

McCrory testified he fired at the boy's legs. Dep. Coronor Frederick D. Newbarr said the bullet, which entered Terry's head, was flattened in such a way that it could have rico-cheted.
