Business to be transacted in-cludes election of national officers for the next two years and selection of current agen-da items to be studied and da items to be studied and acted on in the next two years. Proposed items are: U. S. Foreign Policy—support of policies which promote stability, freedom, and peaceful development, with emphasis on the United Nations system, world trade and economic development, and collective security; Water Resources—promotion Water Resources — promotion of the optimum development and use of water resources consistent with river basin

The following continuing responsibilities are also pro-posed which are items the league has already studied and wishes to maintain interest in: (1) Modification of federal loyalty-security programs to limit scope, standardize procedures, apply "common sense" judgment, and provide the greatest possible protection for the individual; (2) Self-govfor the individual; (2) Self-gov-ernment for the District of Co-lumbia and extension of suf-frage to the citizens of the Dis-trict; (3) Measures granting the President authority to veto items in appropriation bills; (4) Opposition to constitutional limitation on tax rates; (5) Opposition to constitutional changes that would limit the existing powers of the Execu-tive and the Congress over foreign relations
