What to Buy This Week In Your Local Markets

As a service to the housewives in the Torrance Herald area, a new feature of consumer marketing information is being published as a result of a survey of markets in the vicinity. In this survey, meats available and their price ranges are listed as well as seasonable fruits and vegetables.

PROTEIN FOODS

Poultry: Lots of it—comparatively reasonable in price.
Chicken: Reasonable in price. Fryers and large (tom) turkeys halved and quartered.
Beef: Not much change in supply and price in immediate future. One meat expert predicts a drop at retail of from 3 to 5 cents by middle of June. Some "specials" this week will put beef in line with other meats.
Lamb: Quality high and much more in market. The

new crop of lambs grew unusually large and meaty. Watch for lowered prices on those in the 65 to 85 pound class. Cuts from 43 to 58 pound lambs will range 2 to 3 cents more per pound.

Pork: Prices are steady to strong. Ham shanks to be "specialized" here and there, and there seems to be a little more fancy bacon than usual. A good indication, you may find the price lowered somewhat.

ON THE PRODUCE STANDS

At long last we are getting into the strawberry season. This week should see a more nearly normal supply of berries in our markets. Rain damage has been erased—quality of berries much improved. Prices also settling down to normal.

Avocados, the Fuerte variety, still flooding the stands. We can plan on an abundance for the next few weeks—then there'll be a gradual change over to the summer varieties.

Apples, Winter Pears nearing end of season. Make the most of those we have. Remember, they have been refrigerated all winter. Keep apples in your refrigerator—

Asparagus, the springtime favorite, has really come into its own. Just can't be better than it is right now. Cabbage, Cauliflower and Squash (summer and Zucchini) are "buys" of the week. Lettuce. If you want to keep costs down on salads you'll concentrate on head lettuce. Other greens trying to make a comeback from the "unusual" weather.

Publicity posters were on display and the progress made by the coordinating committee was reported by Mrs. John Iwata. The show promises to be one of great entertainment Saturday, June 7.

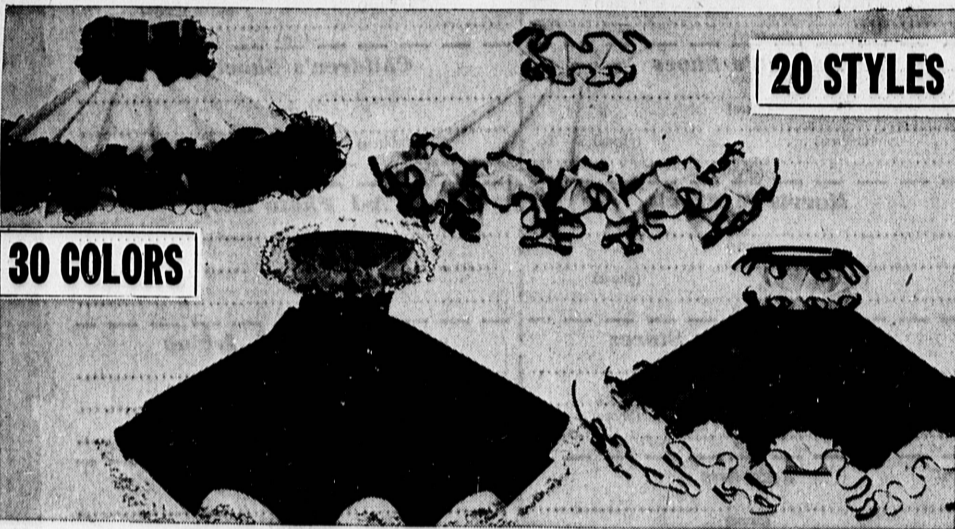
AFS DISTRICT MEET APRIL 27
