Aquarium Unit Enters Annual Hobby Show

Doors to the civic auditorium will open at 6 p.m. on May 16 for the annual Flower, Art and Hobby Show.

For the fifth successive year, the Harbor Aquarium Society will present a "Show within a show" with its display of aquariums and tropical fish. The show is open to the public and there is no admission charge. The event is sponsored by the Recreation Department, the Torrance Terrace Garden Club and the Torrance Fuchsia Society. The doors will be open from 6 to 9 p.m. on Friday, May 16; from 12 noon until 9 p.m. on Saturday, May 17; and from 12 noon until 9 p.m. on Sunday, May 18.

In the past few years the Aquarium Show has attracted many spectators and each year the display has been larger and of a greater variety. At this time, there are over 20 aquariums listed for entry in the Aquarium Show, ranging in size from a 25 gallon tank to a small one gallon aquarium. The 20 gallon club tank will contain some very interesting tropical fish as well as lovely aquarium plants. Among the fish on display will be the Lyretail Panchax, Guppies, Bettas, Tetras, Platies, the highly colored Cardinal fish, and many others of the numerous varieties of colorful tropicals that are favorites of fish hobbyists.

There will be a junior and senior division of the Aquarium Show and awards will be made in each division. During the show there will be club members present at all times to answer any questions about the fish or the hobby.


The agenda for the hat party is being planned by Mrs. Don Wolf and Mrs. W. C. Boswell.
