1 teaspoon salt 11/2 cups sifted flour

2 cups quick oatmeal 1 pkg. choc. chips (7 oz.) Pre-heat oven at 350 degrees.

Cream shortening, both sugars, and eggs together. Beat until creamy. Dissolve soda in hot water, add to mixture. Add vanilla and salt. Add flour to mixture. Add oatmeal and chocolate chips.

Drop by teaspoon onto a greased cookie sheet and bake (350 degrees) until light brown.
