GARDENERS CHECKLIST

Three

1. Plant shrubs and trees from containers any time. Water and feed carefully to help them over the transplanting change.

2. Prune and shape evergreens of all kinds. A little careful work with the pruning shears will bring out the best in all shrubs.

3. Bait for earwigs if they weren't destroyed in the general garden clean-up. 4. A mulch of peat moss or weed-free manure con-

serves water, cools plants' roots and discourages weeds.

5. Water deeply. There is no sense at all to the light, frequent sprinkling practiced by some gardeners. Water must reach plants' roots.
