### City Proposes Two-Cat Limit

Public hearings on an ordinance which would limit the cat population to two per residence, and would outlaw all cats except the domestic housecat will be held before the city council at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

Under the terms of the proposed ordinance regulating Torrance's feline population for the first time, owners

would be required to pay a \$2 annual tax for male and spayed female cats and \$4 a

year for each unspayed female cat. The license fee would be payable before July 1 each year. The regulation would apply to all cats over 10 weeks old.
