

**Thomas Wins Re-election;** King, DiMiceli in Runoff

Assemblyman Vincent Thomas took both ends of the primary ballot here Tuesday to win re-election as the representative of the 68th Assembly District, final tabulation of ballots showed Friday.

At the same time, tabulation of the 17th Congressional District balloting showed that Attorney Leonard DiMiceli of San Pedro won the Republican nomination against Democrat Cecil King, and the

two will square off in the general election in November.

Thomas was re-elected on an over-all majority of more than 34,000 votes, but won the Republican nomination by only 274 votes over Tom Brewer of Torrance.
