## **Fallout Can Hit** Friend and Foe With Equal Ease

The horrors of Hiroshima left an indelible imprint of fear in the mind of every human being who knows the piti-ful results of that first use of atomic power by man. For years after that unhappy event our American newspapers and our American newspapers and periodicals carried many pictures and stories of the scar red survivors of that holocast. Since then, frequent experi-ments with atomic and nuclear weapons have added an even more terrifying element to this basic fear, the dread of radia-tion "fall-out." This dread of fall-out is

This dread of fall-out is based upon the fact that it is an unseen attacker which can strike friend or foe. Its spread is controlled only by wind and weather. So far, no scientist or physician can predict the type of result to be expected when the human body is invaded by the radioactivity of fall-out; anything from sterility to freakishly abnormal offspring are considered by some to be possible after serious contamipossible after serious contamination. Others are more cautious, so nothing is certain.

Just this spring, a real alarm was sounded when tests of ra-dioactivity in a Bay Area rain-storm showed is content to be storm showed is content to be 200 times the maximum be-lieved safe for human drink-ingwater. A few days later, a similar test at Sacramento re-vealed a radioactive content in a rainstorm there to be more than 12 times normal. These facts alerted the subcommittee on air pollution and radiation protection of the Assembly in-terim committee on public health.

Meeting in San Francisco
last week, the subcommittee
heard testimony from a number of scientists, public health
experis, air pollution officials
and disaster control specialists, as well as from a number
of mothers interested in the
safety of their children.

University of California geneticists told the legislative
group that while there is a
slight increase in measurable
man-made radiation in the atmosphere, "the risk to human
beings is so small that none of
us has to worryabout it." It
was said that of about 200,000
California children born each was said that or about 200,000 California children born each year, there would be not more than 50 or 60 who would be subject to danger from manmade radiation, and that this would include danger from exposure to X-rays and other posure to X-rays and other peace-time radiating devices.

Spokesmen for public health agencies outlined a long range program of radiation testing of air, water and food samples. Declaring that the need for constant testing was brought "sharply into focus by the radioactive rainfall" of last spring, witnesses told the committee that greatly increased mittee that greatly increased equipment and larger num-bers of trained men would be needed for the work.

Evidence presented to the subcommittee sharply pointed up the existing shortcomings in coordination between the state department of public health, the state disaster of-fice, the Federal Atomic Energy Commission, and local ag-encies concerned. Two sugges-tions were advanced to remedy the difficulty: first, that one of the governor's secretar-ies be named to act as coordinator of all radiation testing; and second, that a central lab-oratory be set up in the public oratory be set up in the public health department. Greater exchange of information between agencies on radiation hazards was declared to be urgently needed.

Based upon the results of this first hearing it seems certain that protection against radiation fall-out will be an important topic for consideration

portant topic for consideration by your legislature at the 1959 session. The investigating sub-committee will hold additional hearings elsewhere in the state this coming fall.
