Torrance High School Pupils Garner Top Awards Last Term

Torrance high school students marched off with a number of awards during the 1957-58 school year in scholarship, art, music, speaking and other fields.

Some 192 students at North, South, and Torrance High Schools were members of the school's scholarship societies, with 47 scholarship and awards winners at NHS and THS. South High has no seniors this year.

Musically speaking, choral or instrumental groups from all three schools topped honors. North High's Girls Glee Club and Choir both won excellent ratings in the Southern California Vocal Festival, Torrance High's combined choral groups were rated superior in district competition. South High's choir member Earl Wycoll and Judith Johnson were chosen for the National Music Educators' Choir and Toxic French and John Widney won places in the same group's band.

South High's Band won an excellent rating in the Southern California Music Festival. The THS musicians participated in USC's Band Day and were invited to UCLA's Band Day. They rated second in the Kiwanis district competition and played at the East-West bowl game.

At Torrance High, Margaret Halaway won a vocal award in the Arion Music program, while William Colby won in the instrumental class. Mike Malen won third in a high school and college piano competition.

On the athletic field, North High's golf and tennis teams ended up first in their leagues, while Torrance High's cross-country men won the Southern Section title in the CIF. South High's Cees won Crescent League championships in track and dual meets, while taking a sportsmanship blanket.

Torrance High's annual won a top rating in competition with other school yearbooks. South High journalist Bill Edwards won a prize for the story he wrote describing his experiences during "a day in the Navy." He received a replica of the U.S.S. Los Angeles in a recent presentation.

North High coed Carolyn Lundee placed fifth in the USC Invitational Speech tourney, while Bob Brooks and Jim Watkins of South High and Judy Lundboom of Torrance High were winners in the Jaycee-sponsored Voice of Democracy contest. Eija Salma, NHS, rated first in the dramatic interpretation category of the Southern California Debate League Tourney. Carolyn Waddingham, NHS, reached the zone finals of the Lions Club Student Speakers' Contest.
