

Local Plant Sends Firebee to Canada

The first Ryan Aeronautical Torrance, with shipment to Co. Firebee jet target drone acquired by a foreign military service was delivered Friday to the Royal Canadian Air Force at the company's Torrance Division.

The gleaming, remote-controlled, high-speed drone is the forerunner of a substantial number of U. S. Navy type KDA-4 Firebees ordered by the RCAF for testing and evaluating its present and future weapons systems at Cold Lake, Alberta, a major weapons firing range.

 Firebee will have a built-in radio transmitter and receiver which will enable it to fly in a controlled manner from the range at a distance up to 50 miles. The Firebee is powered by a jet engine and is capable of flying at speeds in excess of 1,000 m.p.h. and for durations of up to 100 minutes. New Plaster Finish Ends Water Worry

A plaster finish that defies moisture was announced today by the Southern California Plastering Institute, research and development organization of the California organized taping and plastering industry.

The new product, already approved by municipal building departments, answers the age-old problem of water penetration of plaster walls and ceilings in areas where there is an abnormally high concentration of moisture, according to an institute spokesman.

In addition to its commercial and industrial uses, the new plaster will be widely used for the surfacing of walls and ceilings in home shower rooms.

Another feature of the new finish is its ability to take color pigments. This permits the home decorator to design her bath and shower-room in colors which complement her decor without repainting year after year.
