Beef heart 1 bay leaf  
Salt and pepper 2 c. water  
Small onion

Cook beef heart in pressure cooker with above ingredients.

Dampen bread crumbs. Brown onion, celery, bacon, salt, pepper and sage. Add to crumbs, mix well. Put dressing in cloth on rack. Place heart over dressing. Cook 45 minutes. Brown in oven while making gravy by adding two tbsp. cornstarch to liquid.

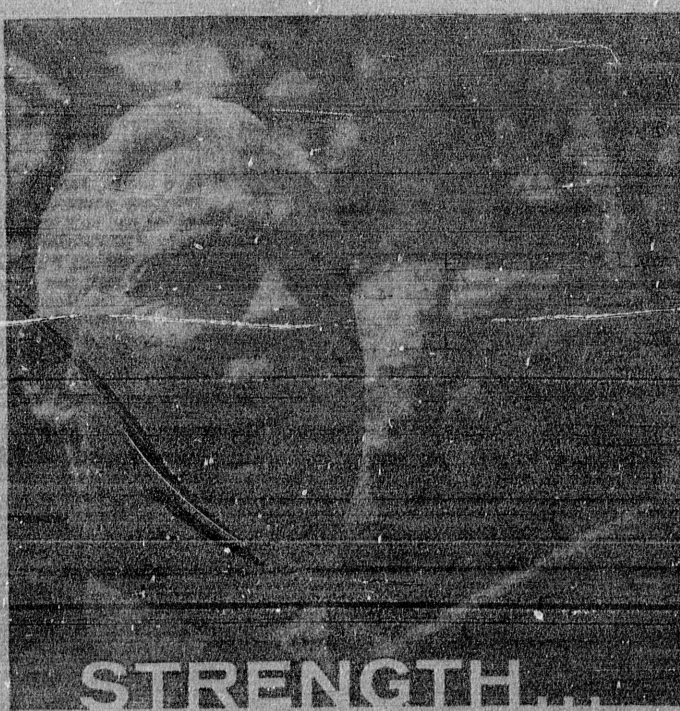
