Board May Seek \$15 Million Bond Approval Next October

The possibility of an October bond issue to provide additional needed classroom facilities for Torrance's expanding school population was eyed Tuesday night by the Torrance Board of Education.

A \$15,000,000 figure for the bond issue was discussed, although no definite action was taken. The board was told that a conservative estimate of building needs for the next seven years indicates that at least \$12,700,000 in new buildings will be needed to house only the children who now live in this district.

New facilities needed included 189 new elementary classrooms, a complete new West High School plant, a fourth unit for South High School, rehabilitation of Fern School, and other projects.

At the time a \$10,000,000 bond issue was passed in June, 1958, officials believed that

this would be enough money to build enough schools until 1960, but rising costs and the mushrooming growth of the city have used up nearly all this sum.

Assistant Superintendent S. E. Walters told the board that unless a bond issue is passed this fall, the elementary building program in Torrance will come to a halt. At the present rate of building, school officials hope to virtually eliminate the double session here within a year, barring some large unforeseen residential development.

It was pointed out that a bond issue would in no way affect the school district's tax rate. Taxes would not increase if the issue was passed, nor would they go down if it were not passed.

The issue requires a two-thirds vote of the people.

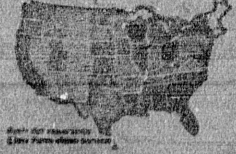
