Thirteen school areas officially opened for the first time this week. This brings to a total of 23 the recreational facilities now open to the people of Torrance. Available to the public are: 13 school playgrounds, six parks, a pitch and putt golf course, a municipal plunge, an adult recreation center, and a craft center. In contrast with the park areas which open at 9 a.m., school playground programs begin at 1 p.m. and end at 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The schools will operate on a half day schedule from Monday, June 30 to Friday, Aug. 1.
