

Census of Vets Now Scheduled

A census will be taken in 1958 of California's great veteran population. U. S. Sen. Bill Norris announced today from his Southern California headquarters.

Norris recently asked Congress Secretary Sineclair Weeks to include the state-wide tally of ex-veterans with the regular census. The Senate majority leader told Weeks the census will prove valuable to California's veterans organizations, state and civic officials and thousands of business enterprises working for and with veterans.

Census Director Robert Burgess advised Norris that the bureau is now drafting plans to gather data on the state's two million former G.I.s. The data will include needs of veterans and a record of how many California residents served in the Korean conflict, World Wars I and II and all earlier wars.

Lewis Stoneker, director of rehabilitation American Legion, Department of California, said a true census of California's veteran population will show a dire need for additional veterans' facilities which are provided by the federal government.

One example, said Stoneker, are hospital facilities to care for thousands of seriously-ill and indigent veterans who migrate to California from other states.

Record Enrollment Topped at Camino

With summer enrollment at El Camino College reaching an all-time high of 5200, the campus now anticipates its first fall semester with a registration in excess of 10,000 students.

Approaching its 12th year, the college is preparing for an 11,000 enrollment for the fall, spring registration hit a peak of 10,000.

Five times high in summer enrollment was 500 less than the current pace-setting mark, Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel, announced today.

In opening for the fall semester, the college will be under the direction of its second president, Dr. Stuart E. Marnee, who will assume that post officially on Aug. 1. During the month of July Dr. Marnee is serving on campus in the capacity of associate superintendent of the El Camino Junior College district.

Students planning to register for fall programs will be enabled to make appointments for counseling on July 21 at the counseling office, located in the college administration building at 18007 S. Crenshaw Blvd., Sloan announced.

"Those who make appointments first will be the first to register," the director advised.

"This," he elaborated, "means assurance of enrollment in desired classes. With the heavy enrollments which we have experienced in the past few years, late registrants are often disappointed because classes are closed before they are able to establish their programs of study. It is not always financially possible to add classes to accommodate these late enrollees," he continued.

Returning students wishing to enroll for part-time schedules will have their first opportunity to register from 1 p.m. until 5:30 p.m. Aug. 6. New part-time students may secure permits to register in the registration office beginning July 28.

"All students must complete required college placement tests five days prior to registration," the college administrator noted. Information regarding the schedule for the tests—prerequisites for such courses as chemistry 1A, mathematics, English, beginning shorthand, and foreign languages—may be obtained in person in the registration office.

Allocations Made to Area Chest Agencies for Year

Allocations to 17 agencies based in the Harbor district were announced this week by J. A. Robinson, chairman of the Harbor Area Welfare Federation board of directors.

Agencies receiving allocations were: Beacon Light Mission, \$15,192; Boys' Club of San Pedro, \$28,604; Los Angeles Council of Boy Scouts which includes Long-Harbor City, Wilmington, Torrance and Gardena Scout Councils, \$372,360; Camp Fire Girls, \$57,872; Catholic Maritime Club, \$19,680; Catholic Welfare Bureau which maintains offices in Gardena and San Pedro, \$127,478 with an additional \$71,500 earmarked for special emergency needs; Girls Scouts Los Angeles Council, \$155,972; Harbor Area Welfare Planning Council, \$221,080; CYO including Mahar House in Wilmington, \$273,900; Salvation Army-Family Service, \$56,472; Seaman's Church Institute, \$7,009; Homer Toberman Settlement House, \$28,044; Veteran's Service Center including the San Pedro and Torrance offices, \$124,932; The Visiting Nurse Assn., \$58,641; Wilmington Community Center, \$20,352; and Harbor Area YWCA, \$68,736.

Robinson, who is also a member of the Community Chest general budget Committee, explained that funds are allocated to all chest agencies by different budget review committees, each review committee being devoted to a group of agencies providing a particular kind of service.

According to Robinson classifications of agencies not located in the Harbor Area but serving Harbor residents were: Children's Hospitals and Clinics, Adult Clinics, Maternity Homes, Psychiatric Hospitals and Clinics, Specialized Personal Services, Institutional Care, Service to Dependent and Neglected Children, Children's Homes, Foster Care, Adoption, Day Nurseries and such National Organizations as the Travelers Aid Society and The USO.
