BEST BUYS FOR THE WEEK

In Torrance Markets

PROTEIN FOODS

POULTRY ITEMS (particularly fryers, and turkeys) are the budget stretchers in the meat departments of all markets. BEEF, LAMB and PORK show no general tendency to drop in price, but you will find more promotional activity in beef. Watch your favorite market for "specials" on beef cuts, and you'll find pork loins featured at markets here and there. If you must have bacon with your eggs apparently you'll have to pay high prices until fall. Delicatessen meats—cold cuts, luncheon meats, franks, etc.—of course, are always in ample supply during summer months.

EGGS are holding at a fairly steady level. They are a protein value at going prices.

VEGETABLES

CORN is a "standard" from here on out to the end of summer.

CUCUMBERS are plentiful. The small pickling size is available. You'll find all the pickling ingredients ready for you, spices, fresh dill, etc.

PEPPERS, Heavy supplies. EGGPLANT is abundant for the first time this season. A delicious vegetable—one that you may need to be reminded to use.

SALAD GREENS. Both lettuce and romaine flooding the market. Perfect for the salad season.

FRUITS

MELONS. Both cantaloupes and watermelons are more plentiful. The quality is perfect.

NECTARINES are about the most abundant summer fruits. PEACHES to be a little short for about a week until the "late varieties start coming—the "regular" Elbertas, Rio Osa Gems, etc.

ON THE PRODUCE STANDS

Wilted vegetables are no bargain. If vegetables are wilted it's a safe bet that not much vitamin C is left in them. Even if they are revived or "crisped" in ice water or in the refrigerator, their vitamin C is not restored. So keep vegetables from wilting if you want the most value from them, the U.S. Department of Agriculture advises homemakers.

Limp vegetables may still "contain" the vitamins and minerals, but not for vitamin C. Bruised produce probably has lost vitamin A as well as C. Treat vegetables gently. Wash them and refrigerate promptly.

STARTING TO MOVE TO MARKET. Gravenstein apples made their first appearance of the season. As they mature a little more they are a wonderful eating apple. Now they are perfect for pies and sauce. Still high in price. Same is true of Bartlett pears. They are here—but just starting.

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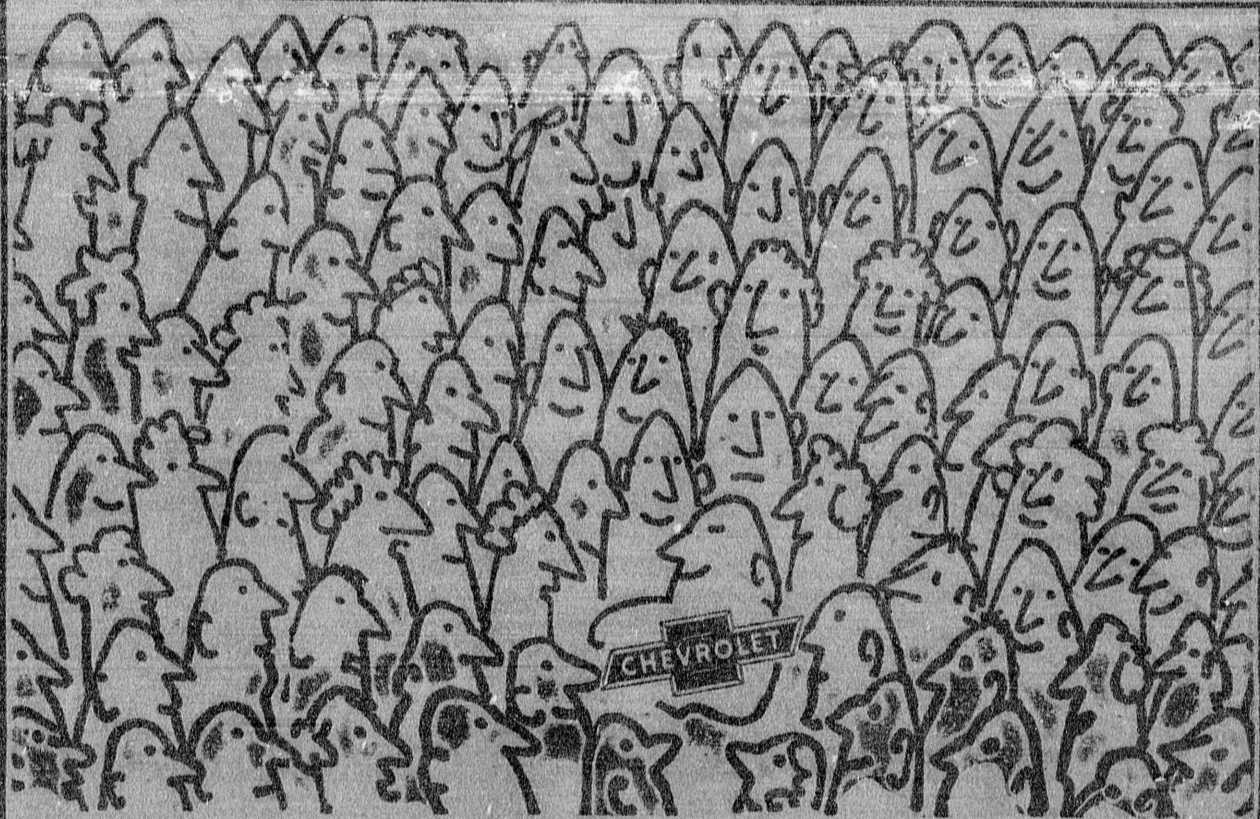

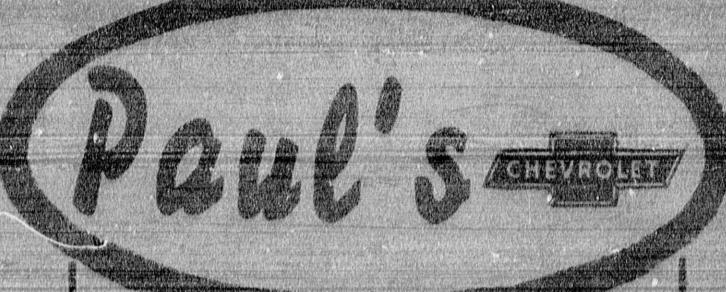
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
