Patricia Reynolds Describes Her Week at 1958 Girls State

Editors Note: Patricia Reynolds, North High student, who was selected to attend California Girls State at Davis, sponsored by the Bert S. Crowder Unit 170, American Legion Auxiliary gives a detailed report of Girls State activities. Patricia was elected Lieutenant Governor of Girls State.

By Patricia Reynolds As we boarded the bus that was to take us to California Girls State at Davis, we never thought this would be a week we would never forget. We arrived at the University of California campus at 6:30 a.m. We registered and were assigned rooms in either of 2 dormitories. Free time was ours until six o'clock that night at which time we had our first meal together. 405 girls were present. After dinner things began to move fast. Cities were organized and setting city officials were chosen. The next morning, after breakfast, we again gathered in cities, and distributed petitions to those girls wishing to run for city office. After petitions were checked, elections were held. Officials were sworn in later that night. One of the many wonderful things about Girls State was the friendship hour held every night before retiring. As we continued our activities the next day, counties were organized and county elections were held. Before each election there was a lecture on that particular type of government, given by authorities. Now was the big day for all of us wishing to run for state offices. The two parties, WHIG and TORY, began to organize. Party leaders were chosen, yet leaders were selected and a platform and campaign tactics were chosen. Breakfast, lunch and dinner were the scenes of intense party rivalry for the next three days. That evening rallies and speeches for primary election were held. Friday morning brought about the all important election. Along with all the excitement of elections was coming the highlight of our trip—a tour of the state capital at Sacramento. Among the places we visited was the Senate Chamber, Secretary of State and Treasurer's office. The big moment was our tour through the governor's private office. After returning from our tour of the capital a picnic supper awaited us, as well as the task of picking candidates for Girls State offices. This was done by listening to the speeches of each candidate. Saturday morning the elections were held. During lunch each candidate anxiously awaited the results. The final results were as follows: Governor: Suzanne Horney, Alhambra; Lt. Governor: Patricia Reynolds, Torrance; Secretary of State: Carolyn Pelt, Panorama City; Controller: Camela Sansone, Santa Ana; Treasurer: Patricia Tate, Modesto; Attorney General: Robbie Chappel, Los Angeles; Superintendent of Public Instruction: Ann Freyling, Ocean-side. An inaugural dinner and installation was held that evening with A. Ronald Butten, California State Treasurer administering the oath of office. With an exciting day behind us, Sunday saw each girl attending the church of her choice. Off the political side of things was the classical hour held Sunday night. With one day left many tears of happiness and sadness were shed. 'Lamps of the Culture', a climax to a most wonderful week, was the theme of the closing ceremonies held Monday night. I would like to give my special thanks to the American Legion Auxiliary for giving me the opportunity of this wonderful experience, as well as the wonderful friendships I have made.
