**12,000 Northrop Workers Get Raise**

More than 12,000 personnel of the Northrop and Nortronics Divisions of Northrop Aircraft, Inc., will receive a one-cent an hour cost-of-living increase effective Aug. 4.

The raise is based on a 0.4 increase in the Consumer's Price Index which reached 123.7 for the three month period ended June 15, 1958.

The increase applies to Northrop and Nortronics personnel located at Hawthorne, Anaheim, Pasadena, Edwards Air Force Base, Torrance, El Segundo, Los Angeles International Airport, Holloman Air Force Base, New Mexico, and Patrick Air Force Base, Florida.

**Coleman Co. Earnings Up**

In the April 30, 1958 annual report released yesterday Coleman Engineering Co., Inc., of Torrance and subsidiaries, announced a consolidated net income of \$150,076, after taxes, which is an increase of 44% over the \$104,014 earned for the previous fiscal year ended April 30, 1957. This amounts to \$1 per share on 121,296 common shares after payment of \$23,800 in preferred dividends. Earnings last year on the common stock were equivalent to 76¢ per share on 106,800 shares then outstanding.

Sales for the period were \$5,598,701, as compared with \$3,813,148 reported a year earlier, or an increase of 47%.

On May 16, 1958, Coleman Engineering Co., Inc. increased its stock ownership of Heat-Coleman, Inc. from 57% to 83.4%. With this subsidiary's earnings running ahead of last year, and the increased ownership participation, it is expected that Coleman's earnings will continue to improve, according to T. C. Coleman, president, Heat-Coleman, Inc., manufacturer of timers and timing devices.

Income of Coleman Engineering Co., Inc. from research and development for the government's missile and aircraft activities produced about 50% of the company's profit. The balance came principally from the sale of proprietary products, which in addition to cameras and automatic timing devices consisted of missile test and checkout equipment, automatic data handling and control equipment.
