It has been said that a housewife's duties, the operation of a home with the planning of three meals a day for 365 days in every year, can become one of the most boring of all arts. It's usually taken for granted with the little words of appreciation left unsaid.

But this is not so when you have a cheering section consisting of a husband and five children as is the case at the home of the Robert Lewellen, Jr.s, at 1623 Elm. Here, mother performs her duties amid much fanfare and appreciation.

LAYERED ENCHILADA PIE

- 1 lb. ground hamburger
- 1 onion (chopped)
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 4 1/2 oz. can ripe olives (chopped)
- 1 1/2 c Cheddar cheese (grated)
- 1/2 c water
- 8 oz. can tomato sauce
- 6 tortillas, spread with butter

Brown beef with onions; add seasonings and tomato sauce. In a casserole alternate layers of buttered tortillas, meat sauce, grated cheese and olives; add water, cover and bake in oven 400 degrees for 20 min. Cut into wedges with sharp knife. This will serve 6.

SNICKERDOODLES

- 1 c soft shortening
- 1 1/2 c sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 1/2 c sifted flour
- 2 tsp. cream of tartar
- 1 tsp. soda
- 3/4 tsp. salt

Mix thoroughly shortening, sugar, and eggs. Sift together flour, cream of tartar, soda and salt. Stir into first mixture. Roll in mixture of 2 tbsp. sugar and 2 tsp. cinnamon. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 8 to 10 minutes at 400 degrees until lightly browned, but still soft. These cookies puff up at first, then flatten out with crinkled tops. Makes approximately 5 dozen.
