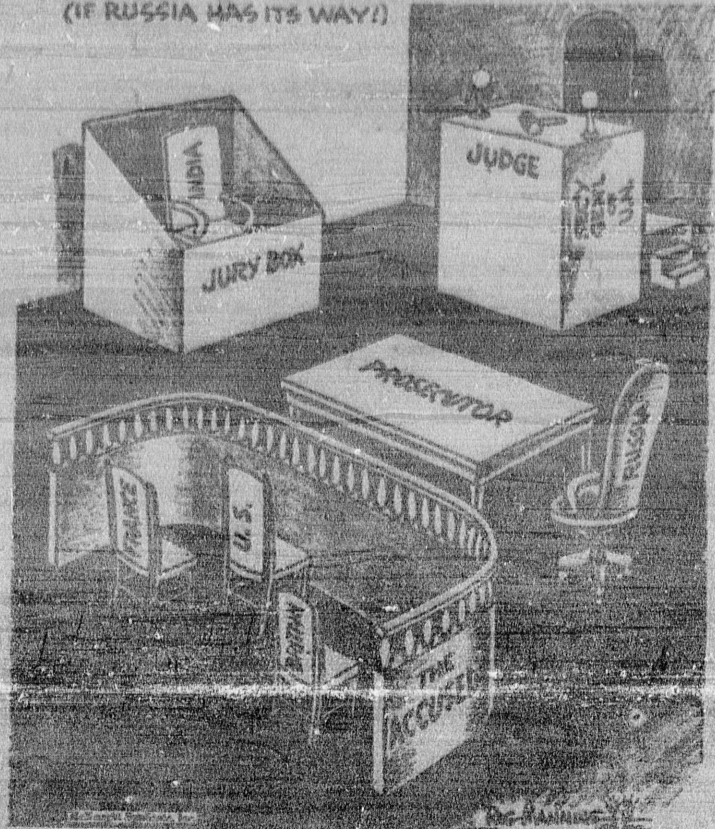

LAW IN ACTION

Laws of Business

The law allows a business a wide choice of ways to set itself up, to finance and manage itself.

You may have sole ownership, partnerships, joint ventures, corporations, and with these different forms.

To meet modern business conditions, to get full tax advantage, and to protect investors, for example, the law provides many ways for a company to finance itself.

When you buy a share of stock in a company, you own an "undivided" part of everything it owns, but no particular piece of its property.

But what you do have when you buy a corporation's bond or debenture? You own nothing of the company.

Unlike a stockholder, a bondholder as a rule has little to say directly about who manages and how he manages the company.

Thus if the corporation quits or goes bankrupt, it must pay the bondholders off before the stockholders get anything.

Therefore does the "preferred" come in? As a rule, preferred stockholders collect a fixed dividend after the bondholders are paid but before the "common" stockholders get anything.

The nab of a patent is that it must contribute to the progress of science or the useful arts.

First write out a record of your device, telling what it is and how it works, with drawings or photographs.

Then explain your invention to someone you can trust and likely will be able to find in years to come.

Next, see if your invention is "probably patentable." Lawyers experienced in patent work are well able to have a search made for patents already in your field.

Your application has four main parts: (1) Your specification describes how to make and use your invention.

(2) Your drawings show how you plan to carry out your invention.

(3) Your claims cover the scope of your exclusive rights for each new feature or combination.

At the patent office specialists examine your application. The examiner may write you raising questions or pointing out earlier patents and publications.

Marking your device "patent applied for" has no legal effect but may discourage copyists.

Unnecessary Grief

Two pictures for parents to remember appeared in recent newspapers.

One showed a mother and seven children gathered about a man in an iron lung. The caption, under a Michigan date-line, said that the whole family had been vaccinated against polio except the father.

The other showed an infant of five months in a respirator tank. The caption, datelined from Texas, said the baby was a victim of polio paralysis.

What does a father think when he gazes up from an iron lung into the sorrowing, bewildered faces of his children? What goes through a mother's mind when she looks down on the polio-wasted body of her child?

One thing they must both realize, to their horror and regret, is that polio today is unnecessary. There is a safe and effective weapon against it in the Salk vaccine.

For ten days last year, about the time you were born out of seven, in fact. And among these neglected or neglected millions, none is safe from polio—neither the helpless infant nor the wage-earner of a family.

The Salk vaccine can protect you against this dreadful and incurable disease. Don't take a chance—take your polio shots now before disaster overtakes you.
