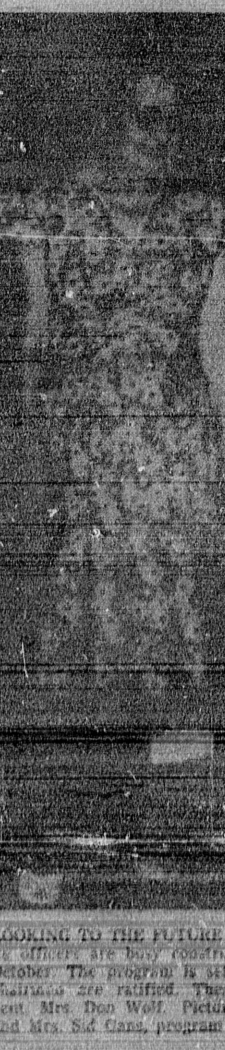
Dear Ann: I've been going steady with a fine man for several months. He doesn't drink or smoke and his morals are the finest I've seen and he's 29. We've both been engaged
