arrived by plane from Angola, West Africa. It was the first time home in five years for Robin and his family and of course the first time the grandparents had seen the twins. Five years ago, Robin, a missionary for the United Church of Christ, was sent to Angola where he taught the Umbundi tribe of natives. Angola is 300 miles inland, south of the Belgian Congo. He has been teaching trades to the natives and since his students were from 12 to 20 years of age, he introduced basketball and coached soccer, which the natives call "Futebol". Robin Markham is the son of Dr. Veazie Markham who has served as medical advisor for the Torrance School system since 1947 coming here from Long Beach. Dr. Markham spent several years in Africa and was head of the Dondi hospital which he constructed and taught medicine to the natives. He and Mrs. Markham returned to the States in 1953 after 10 years in Angola.
