Pioneers Nose Out Playoff of Tie Bay All-Star Team To Decide Title

Little Gary Kimbrell, 5' 4" Hawthorne halfback turned "giant" for several hours Friday night as he led the Pioneer League All-Stars to a narrow 7-6 victory over the Bay League in the third annual Optimist Club charity game at El Camino Stadium.

A disappointing crowd of less than half the 7,000 capacity looked on as Kimbrell piled up big yardage and did all the pioneer's scoring to garner the games outstanding player award.

THE BLUE-SHIRTED Pioneers scored their lone, but deciding touchdown on the first offensive series traveling 79 yards in 14 plays.

The alert signal-calling of Hawthorne's Mike Gillespie caught the Bay defense by surprise as he mixed a fine running attack with well-timed passes.

REACHING THE Bay League 12-yard line, Gillespie took a handoff to Glen Brown, Morningside fullback, then skirted the end, liberating to Kimbrell on the five. Kimbrell raced into the corner of the end zone for the score. Gillespie's handoff to Kimbrell for the conversion proved to be the winning margin for Coach Hal Chauncey's Pioneer squad.

The yellow-jerseyed Bay Leaguers wasted no time getting into the scoring column as Butch White, of Torrance returned the kickoff to the 25. Santa Monica's A. J. Bailey then roared 75 yards through the Pioneer defense to close out the scoring for the night. The tricky speedster took a pitchout from Inglewood quarterback Larry Courtney to tally just 30 seconds after the Pioneers had capped their T.D. drive.

Chuck McFerrin of Hawthorne blocked the all-important conversion attempt, and what had the makings of a wild scoring free-for-all turned into a nip and tuck defensive battle.

Leon McLaughlin's Bay eleven had several other scoring opportunities thwarted by the fine defensive play of Morningside's Fred Davis.

WITH A MINUTE and a half remaining, Davis intercepted a Courtney pass intended for White on the Pioneer 20, to halt a last bid by the Bay League for an upset. Moments earlier El Segundo tackle, Fred Crook, staved off another drive when he recovered a Bay fumble on the Pioneer 35.

Playing at defensive half back, Davis stole two Courtney serials and was selected as the outstanding defensive back for the Pioneer League. Top Pioneer lineman award went to Morningside tackle, Christ Cottle.

Outstanding Bay League player awards went to Tony Pallante, Leuzinger fullback and defensive center, Jim Wallace, of Torrance.

The victory gave the Pioneer League a two to one edge in the annual series and provided Hal Chauncey with revenge for the 14-0 defeat

Champion of the Torrance softball league will be decided by playoff between the General Telephone and Lovelady Hardware teams, tied with 12 won and three lost in scheduled games. Date of the game has not been decided.

General Telephone's manager, Fred Fletcher, has his ace cricketer, Charlie Canon, ready to go against the Lovelady nine. Manager Don Merrill will counter with either Hank Olson or Bill Potts on the mound.

LAKE HODGES FISHING FINAL LEAGUE STANDINGS

Excellent catches of bass, channel catfish, crappie and bluegills are still coming in at Lake Hodges, the San Diego City-owned reservoir south-west of Escondido. Spicing the Hodges catch are largemouth bass up to 9 pounds and channel catfish up to 3 pounds.

Deep seas sport clips along in high gear with lunker white sea bass taken by the San Diego fleet three hours south of the popular landings dominating border city action. Locally, anglers reaping mid-summer takes of bonita, yellowtail barracuda, white sea bass and scattered catches of nine-fin tuna.

Sportfisher out of Joe Marve's 22nd St. landing hit the jack pot anchoring before daylight at the east-end of Catalina, moon or less pondering the situation. Anglers began hauling fish aboard like they didn't know they weren't supposed to be sitting in a very likely spot. Yellowtail, 47 of them topped by a real maul-back tipping the scales at 44 pounds, 9 ounces. One lunker white sea bass hitting 41 pounds and one small black sea bass, 161 pounds, 12 ounces plus numerous bonita and barries. Al Coast boasted the first yellow. Went to the bottom, gave a tug, something tugged back and he was in business. Altogether he landed six yellows topped by a 24 pound, 9 ounce, four barracuda, three boneheads and the black sea bass. Previous day on the Kloro out of Fishermen's Landing at the border city, hauled aboard a whopping blue-fin topping 34 pounds 10 ounces. Put him high on the qualifying list for the final round in the annual San Diego Yellowtail Derby, besides netting him top weekly prize for the largest fish checked-in and first place loot in the Schinley Sportsmen's Club derby.

As luck would have it, Torrance Rod and Gun charter for white sea bass aboard the Palando to the south, didn't net the 12 aboard all that was expected. Due to dirty water, takes fell off with only one brought to gaff credited to Clovis Justice hitting around 20 pounds. Mashed a bunch of log barracuda, several in the nine pound bracket. Altogether only 47 whites were checked into the landing by the entire fleet, a big drop from counts ranging in the hundreds daily.

Coastal deer hunt producing more hunters than deer as usual. Frasier Mountain most populated by both with 33 checked out opening weekend. So far eight have been hauled back into Torrance. Scattergunners filling up their shootin' irons in preparation of the opening of dove season the first of September. Torrance's hunting population mainly headed for Blith. Has always produced limits, with an abundance of white wings. Holtville rated next with plenty of good shooting. Just not so many white wings.
