### 'Seat of the Pants' Said Best Formula for Writers

The "seat of the pants" formula meaning firmly applying the seat of the pants to the chair at the typewriter, is the most essential "formula" in successful writing Dorothy C. Haskin told Southwest Manuscripters Friday night. "How I Get Into Print" was the topic of her talk.

The prolific Hollywood writer follows her own advice, having sold a staggering 3355 articles and 31 books since she began writing in 1940. She called talent a poor second to the determination it takes to sit down and write, on schedule, and with the same regularity a writer would observe in conventional employment.

ASKED IF SHE used any other "formula" in addition, Mrs. Haskin replied that she begins each new work with three sheets of paper, the first listing the possible markets, the second working out an eye-catching title, and third outlining the article according to the tried and proved formulas known to many writers: I. The Hook (to "hook" the reader's attention, preferably an interesting little story); II. The Theme (plainly stated, "to give the reader a chance to back out if the idea doesn't appeal to him"); III. The Main Body of the Article, and IV. The Conclusion.

SHE URGED would-be article writers to grasp at any opportunity that will help them gain a facility for words, such as doing publicity for their clubs and writing simple fillers and quizzes.

"If you want to write," Mrs. Haskin said, "try your hand at everything until you find your own little niche, then stick with it."
