Esabs End Losing Streak As Girls' Softball Season Hits Homestretch

After having lost for two straight weeks, the Esabs bounced back with a vengeance Tuesday night at McMaster Park to whip the Pirates 15 to 9. They lost no time in getting started and picked up 4 runs in the first inning on 3 hits. By the end of the second inning it looked like the Pirates might make a ball game of it when they closed the score 4 to 2. But when the Esabs came to bat in the third, the roof fell in on the Pirates, so the tune of 10 more runs. By this time the Pirates were reeling, but still managed to score 7 runs of their own in the bottom of the third. Each team had five singles in that inning.

The big batter for the Esabs was the first baseman, Cynthia Pedersen, who hit two singles and a double, plus scoring 3 times. The win goes to pitcher Kathy Fisher, and Terrie Powers gets the loss.

In a season marked by upsets, the biggest one of the summer was pulled by the Devillets Thursday night at Watters Park, when they beat the Pirates 11 to 1. The Vandalis scored one run in the first inning, and that was all the scoring until the bottom of the fifth. At that time Jones opened with a walk, followed by Reed getting on by error. Then there was a strike-out. Up came the center fielder Steve Tomlinson, who promptly blasted out a triple, scoring two runs. This was followed by an error and two walks, which enabled Tomlinson to score from third.

In the top of the sixth the Vandalis got one hit with two outs, and the fourth batter cut to the right fielder. This is the first loss for the Vandalis who still win the league championship. It was a well-earned victory for the Devillets, with the winning pitcher, Kathy Reed, giving up only 5 hits in 6 innings.

In the second game played Thursday the Raiders whopped the Spartans 22 to 1. The Raiders got 10 hits which included a triple, and five doubles, two of them by the first baseman, Nancy Reynolds, and the center fielder, Vi Lucero. The winning pitcher was Mary Resbeck, and Kathy Miller took the loss for the Spartans.

After these games the Vandalis are in first, the Devillets second, the Raiders third, a tie for fourth between the Esabs and the Pirates, and the Spartans and Vickers queens are last.

CHP Review Regulations For Trailers

Motorists towing boat trailers, house trailers, and other type trailer used for moving household goods should review the laws affecting such practice warns the California Highway Patrol.

The following essential points were offered by Patrol Commissioner B. B. Caldwell for review by persons towing such trailers either by passenger car or commercial vehicle:

1. A 45-mile-an-hour maximum speed limit prevails unless a lower speed is posted.
2. Mechanical or electrical turn signals are required if hand and arm signals are not clearly visible from the rear.
3. The towing vehicle must be equipped with a mirror reflecting a view of the highway 200 feet to the rear.
4. One red tail lamp, a license plate lamp, one red reflector, and a stop lamp are required on each vehicle.
5. Hitches must be properly and securely mounted with a legal safety chain to control trailer if hitch fails.
6. The trailer is required to follow substantially in path of the towing vehicle without whipping or swerving.
7. Registration card or temporary permit must accompany trailer.
8. Be sure the license plate is mounted not less than 12 inches nor more than 60 inches from the ground when the trailer is unladen.
