South High Overpass Due in April

An overpass in front of South high school should be completed by April 1, 1959, city and school officials were told Tuesday at a meeting with state highway officials.

The officials decided that the proposed overpass, which will allow SHS students to cross busy Pacific Coast Hwy. to get to the school, should be located just east of the administration building. Ramps will lead students on and off the overpass, which will span the highway at a height of 20 feet.

For safety reasons, a steel mesh enclosure will be placed over the part of the overpass which spans the highway. A fence will be built along the center island of the highway so that pedestrians will have to cross at intersections or on the overpass.

The school district, city, and state will share equally in the cost of the structure, estimated at about \$50,000.
