You'll find the meat departments getting top mention in all markets. Butchers are real happy to announce continued values in beef. Apparently we have all been beef hungry. Some markets report that butchers and wrappers are working overtime in order to keep up with the demand for the beef with lowered price tags.

Lamb prices are steady—quality is fine because good "finished" lambs are moving in.

Pork is down a little—the usual occurrence at this time of year. This drop in price has affected only fresh cuts at present.

Poultry still abundant and continues to be a budget buy. Both chickens and turkeys deserve attention in meal planning.

BARTLETT PEARS: Wonderful quality. These are the canning pears, you know.

APPLES: Boylfowers are replacing Gravensteins, and California Jonathans are making their first appearance. It looks like we are off to a long and happy apple season.
