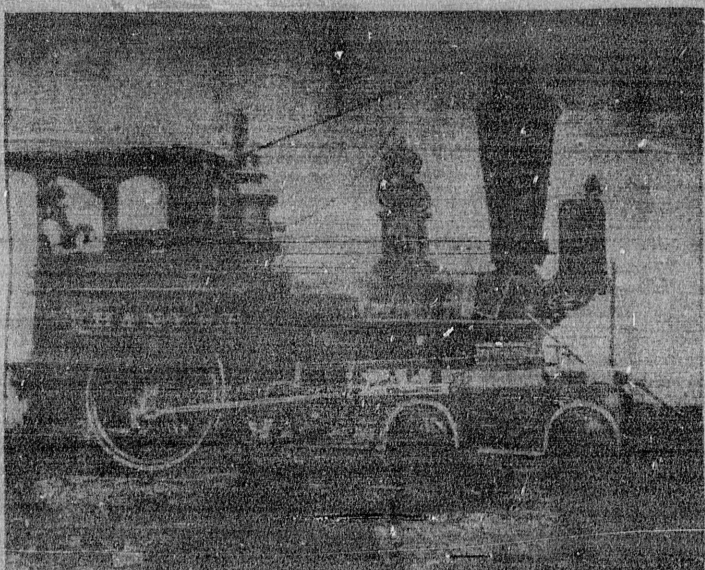

## Cheering Crowd Greets Brown at Torrance Rally

Top Democratic leaders of the Torrance area, civic officials, and party stalwarts jammed the lush area of the Polytechnic Saturday night to hear Attorney General Edmund G. "Pat" Brown charge that the GOP high command in California "needs a thorough housecleaning."

Speaking to a jam-packed crowd of 200 at the outdoor dinner rally, Brown quoted liberally from remarks made by Gov. Goodwin J. Knight in the September issue of Frontier, a California magazine.

"The governor says that at least 65 per cent of the Republican leaders in this state are living in the 19th century," Brown, a candidate for the state's highest post, declared to his cheering audience.

INDIRECTLY answering charges of his opponent, Senator William F. Knowland, that the state's narcotics and crime rate has taken unwarranted jumps in California during Brown's tenure in the attorney general's office, he said:

"I have worked as chief law officer—not chief law enforcement officer—to cut down the high costs of crime in California."

SHARING THE platform with Brown were Mayor Albert Isen, Councilman J. A. Beasley, Richard Floyd, and Rev. Charles Little of the Nazarene Church, who gave the invocation.

Brown was introduced by Isen who presented a key to the city to the visiting official.

"I am presenting this key to a great attorney general and to a great American," Isen said.

MRS. BROWN accompanied her husband to Torrance and was introduced to the audience.

A Hawaiian dinner was served to the huge crowd, and entertainers from the Polytechnic performed throughout the evening following the dinner.

## Unions Said to Have Agreed at Torrance Plant

John Wallace, personnel manager of the Ryan Aeronautical Co., Electronics Division, at Torrance, and Charles Bielsch, regional director of the UAW, jointly announced yesterday that a tentative agreement had been reached on collective bargaining between the Ryan company and the UAW, AFL-CIO, local 821. The agreement covers production and maintenance of the Torrance plant.

Terms of the contract on which the tentative agreement was reached will be released to the public after ratification by the membership of local 821. This is scheduled to take place at a meeting to be held next Tuesday evening.

ALSO ATTENDING the luncheon were Joseph Kaplan, head of the National Safety Council, Los Angeles Chapter; David Gary, public relations and advertising director of the Pep Boys and other company executives.

Two other finalists in the essay competition, William Hiroki Okamura of Los Angeles and John Floyd Kirk of Reseda were awarded \$50 saving bonds and trophies.
