**Fancy Freezer Delights For the Hot Summer Days**

**Frozen Date Delight**

In advance, spoon ice cream into individual paper dishes or little freezer pie pans of aluminum foil on a tray. Cover with grated sweet chocolate and store, tray and all, in freezer until serving time. Or, freeze plain and serve with choice of toppings such as buttered wafers, fresh berries or peaches; canned crushed pineapple; apricot preserves, and the like. These, and the other ideas in this story, prove that, with ice cream always on hand, desserts for outdoor meals are truly a breeze!

**Rainbow Ice Cream Cake**

Cut a long (9" or 10") loaf of angel food cake lengthwise into three layers. Spread a pint of strawberry ice cream on the bottom layer. Put on second layer, spread with a pint of chocolate or mint ice cream. Put on top layer. Put to freeze while you whip half a pint of heavy cream. Sweeten and flavor it lightly. Quickly frost cake all over with the cream, sprinkle with coconut, and put back to freeze. When hard, wrap and store in freezer.

Use either graham cracker or regulation baked crust. Fill with ice cream and freeze. Serve topped with fruit.
