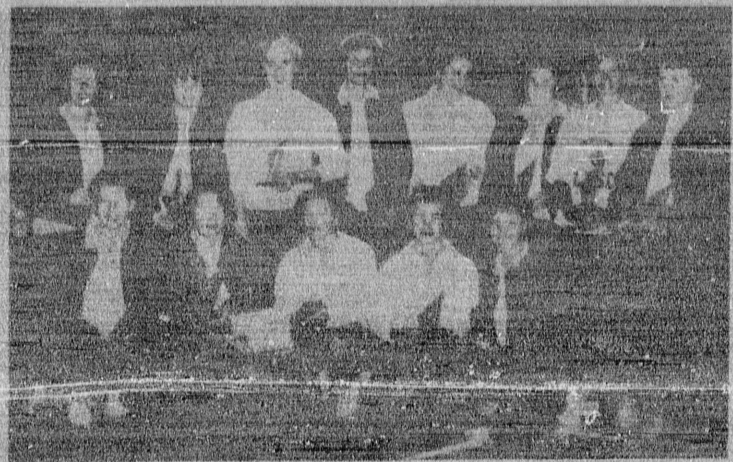

Metropolitan Conference Jaycees In High Gear for Season Openers

Metropolitan Conference footballers are in high gear preparing for the opening of the 1958 season next Friday. East Los Angeles JC and Valley JC initiate the current season on the 19th with the former hosting Taft JC and Valley traveling to San Francisco State. The following evening Bakersfield College is at home with Mesa College of Colorado. All are non-Conference games. The remaining Metro colleges wait until the following week and for their '58 openers.

Joach Joe Berry's Harbor JC Seahawks turned out 42 strong on opening day with three returning lettermen and a host of classy prepsters. Heading the list of freshmen is Huntington Park High's All-City halfback Jim Ludwick, tackle Quiriano Manzo from Banning High School, and Frank Barcott from Mary Star of the Sea High School.

IF NUMBERS mean anything, El Camino College is certain to top their 1957 record of two wins and five losses. Some 83 gridders reported to Coach Norm Verry on opening day with 13 returning from the 1957 team.

Heading the list of vets are tackle Billy Reames, guards Brian Ogden and Wayne Atkins, halfbacks Bruce Siefert and Lynn Hoyam. Add to this list quarterback Frank Olson and end Frank Lathrop from the 1956 squad, and a host of prep stars headed by center Jim Wallace of Torrance, halfback Tony Pallante from Leuzinger, halfbacks Gary Kimbrell of Hawthorne, Dick Trudenthal from Leanon, and Glen Kester from Morningside.

Experience will be pitted against youth Saturday night when the Alumni tackle El Camino College's 1958 varsity hopefuls in a local scrimmage on the local gridiron at 8 p.m.

Triggered by Coaches Norm Becker and Socco Torres, the "Old Pros" are seeking a repeat of last year's 27-0 massacre of the Warriors.

Coach Norm Verry's charges, however, have different plans for the action-hungry veterans. The local gridders would like to return the contest to a reasonable facsimile of Ooster's Last Stand.

WITH THREE WEEKS of hard work under their belts the Warriors are beginning to shape up, but Backfield Assistant Ken Swearingen was quick to point out, "It's hard for perfect strangers to click like a unit with only a few short drills together."

Swearingen noted, "This year's team will have depth and speed in the backfield. We're going to run from a belly series type offense and with the fast backs we have I think our running game will show improvement."

Lynn Hoyem and Bruce

Seifert, returning letterman, and newcomers Dick Freuden-thal, Glen Kezer, Gene Williams, Tony Pallante and Ron Goodman are the big reasons Swearingen expects a strong ground attack.

HOYEM, OPERATING at the signal calling slot, has a strong flipper and is an excellent guide for the ball carriers.

However, Ron Bruckner, a service returnee who is making his first crack at football, Dave Long, who called the plays behind Hal Gillespie at Hawthorne last year, and Phil Stewart, a nifty trending passer, are all pushing Hoyem for the quarterback assignment.

Pallante, former Leuzinger scabbard; Freuden-thal, Lennox High grad, and Williams, up from Mira Costa, continue to sparkle in practice.

THESE ROOKIES are giving the returning ECC balls, Seifert and Conger, a tough battle for the starting berths.

At the fullback position from end; Ron Goodman, a returning line smasher, and Glen Kezer, from Morning-

side, are engaged in a rugged battle.

Up front, Coach Verry is also amazed at the unaccustomed amount of all-around rugged players. Vets Wayne Atkins, John Bishop, Brian Ogden, and Bill Reams form the core of the line crew.

Saturday night's fray will provide the first test for the Warrior eleven, and a tougher foe than the Alums would be almost impossible to find.

For the first time in years the Vandals, winners of the Girls' Softball League, won the All-Star game. 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North Hi Gridders Dig in For Opener

Head coach Bob Shoop and his staff were on hand Tuesday to greet prospective Varsity and J.V. football players as the Saxons began preparations for opening their fourth grid season. The opening game, to be played at Warren high school, Sept. 27, will see the Crusader League power host the north eleven.

Boasting experience and good depth in all positions for the first time, with 12 returning lettermen, the North squad seems to have the bulk of its problems licked, but speed will again be missing. Fifty players, 25 of them seniors, are now on the team roster—making this squad the largest in the Pioneer League.

ERNE THOMPSON at fullback will captain the 56 squad. The six foot, two-pounder, was the leading scorer, top ground gainer and punter last season. He was All-League first string choice in 1957. Bill Hall, 185-pound senior will probably fill the all-important role of quarterback.

When asked about season prospects Coach Shoop replied, "With an all senior eleven for the first time this team may improve on last year's two win

and six lost record and fifth place in the Pioneer loop."

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Sportscaster to Head Lions Club White Cane Days

Ted Husing, famed sportscaster who became blind in 1956, yesterday assumed his role as honorary chairman of the Lions Club's 1958 White Cane Days, which will be held on Sept. 26 and 27.

Now a resident of Pasadena, Husing was greeted by Rochelle Yuhel of Los Angeles, nine year old sightless youngster representing the Foundation for Junior Blind, who will symbolize the 1958 White Cane Days for California and Nevada.

A vivacious child, Rochelle promptly handed Husing on the cheek, as he began his service as honorary chairman. The appointment of Husing was made by Earl R. Barbaum on behalf of the Lions Club's Council of Governors.

Husing, who is being rehabilitated at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital in Los Angeles, recently returned to broadcasting in his program, "Husing Reminiscences in Sports."

Praising the work of Lions Clubs for their efforts in behalf of the blind, Husing said he was "pleased to be associated with the White Cane Days project, and called upon citizens to contribute to the worthy cause."

Husing was with the Columbia Broadcasting System for 26 years until being stricken with a brain tumor in 1956. He occupies the hospital room in New York now being used by injured Doctor Curtis Roy Campanella following his operation.
