The adult clubhouse is an attractive building located behind the Torrance public library and is surrounded by shuffleboard and horseshoe courts. The entire area is screened behind a windbreak hedge.

The main room contains card tables, comfortable lounge chairs, a television, piano, record player and books and magazines. There is an anti-room where lunches are served and a kitchen with a coffee bar.

Started seven years ago and under the sponsorship of the Torrance Recreation Department, the Adult Club has 80 women members and receives many local and out-of-town visitors weekly. The club, and its facilities, are open to all adults. The hours are from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. weekdays and until 6 p.m. on Saturday and Sundays.

Visitors from like clubs in surrounding cities come to the Torrance Adult Club on weekends and compete on the courts and play cards with local members. In return the Torrance members travel by chartered bus to pay return visits to these clubs.

On holidays the club holds potluck dinners with music and dancing. The membership has an equal number of men and mixed play and activities add to the fun for these retired and semi-retired citizens.
