

## SUPERVISORS HONOR LOCAL WAR VETERAN

Capt. Samuel A. Freedman of Torrance was honored before the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors today for his brilliant war record and for the civic leadership which he is rendering his community.

A resident of 4007 W. 176th St., and Commander of William Randolph Hearst Post No. 9815 Veteran of Foreign Wars, Freedman led the Pledge of Allegiance at Tuesday's meeting of the board. He was the guest of Board Chairman Burton W. Chace.

Freedman is Past Judge Advocate of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He is also a member of the South Bay Post 184.

Serving in the Army from 1941 to 1952, he entered as a Private in the Infantry and emerged as a Captain and was disabled in Korea.

Freedman served in World

War II in the Asiatic-Pacific with the First Cavalry in the Occupation of Japan for three years and with the 72nd Tank Battalion, Second Division during the Korean War.

Freedman is on the Editorial Staff of the Los Angeles Examiner and has been with them since 1936. Prior to that time, he was employed by the Hearst Papers in San Francisco and the Associated Press since 1923.

He has lived in Torrance since 1932 where he purchased a home. A son, 15, and a daughter, 8, attend Perry School.

## Poker Promoter Seeks Chance to Form New City

Joseph Asaro, 349 E. 182nd St., whose attempts to have poker clubs legalized in Hermosa Beach earlier this year were unsuccessful, has filed a notice of intention with county officials to incorporate the Victoria section of the Carson area.

Boundaries of the proposed city would be Avalon Blvd., Victoria St., Figueroa St. and Francisco St.

The pro-incorporation notice came to the attention of the County Boundary Commission Wednesday. If the commission determines the validity of 25 of the names on the petition, authority will be granted for Asaro's group to circulate petitions, which in turn would seek signatures of 25 per cent of the property owners representing 25 per cent of total assessed valuation of the area involved.

## Bus Drivers Score 'A' On Report Cards

Torrance school bus drivers got "A's" in safety on their report cards last week, as the results of the 14th annual fleet contest of the Greater Los Angeles Safety Council were revealed.

The Torrance Unified School District finished second in the annual contest, in which the results are based upon the number of accidents per 100,000 miles traveled.

Winner of the division was the Tanner Motor Livery, Ltd. With an accident rate of 1.94, Torrance was the top school fleet. The average accident frequency was 2.94 among the 351 organizations and districts entering the competition, and some 41,000 vehicles were involved.

During the 1957-58 school year, Torrance school buses took more than 1,100,000 children, traveling some 308,000 miles. Only six accidents, all but a minor nature, were reported.

## Kindergarten Snack Hiked To a Nickel

The costs of providing milk and a graham cracker to all kindergarten children in the Torrance Unified School District will go from four to five cents this year.

In an effort to battle inflation, the school board Tuesday approved the hike. Previously, no charge has been made for the graham crackers, which cost the district about \$2500 last year. The action was taken to lessen the cafeteria deficit at most elementary schools.
