In most other parts of the country this is harvest season. But in California both harvesting and planting are going on. Our winter vegetable crops are being planted in the desert areas. Other California districts are harvesting late summer produce and planting winter crops.

**First and Last Call:** The Oak Glen apple growers have a large and exceptionally fine fruit crop ready to come off. There are a few early varieties in now—but wait for a couple of weeks before you go to this section of San Bernardino County for a day's outing and your apple shopping.

**Peaches and Peeps:** From Antelope Valley, Hiltop, Valeriano are practically out of the picture. If you want to pick up your fruit from growers you'll have to hustle. There's very little left.

Most abundant fruits and vegetables are Bellflower and Delicious apples from California orchards, Jonathans, Bartlett pears, and all melons. Snap beans, bell peppers, cucumbers, lettuce, tomatoes, yams, and sweet potatoes are pouring onto the stands.
