### Science Fiction Writer to Address Manuscript Group

Ray Bradbury, noted science-fiction writer, will be guest speaker at a meeting of Southwest Manuscripters at 8 p.m., Friday, at Clark Stadium, 801 Valley Dr., Hermosa Beach.

The West Los Angeles writer achieved international acclaim through such adult science-fiction as his "Martian Chronicles," "Golden Apples in the Sun" and "Fahrenheit 451," sending his fictional rockets into space some 20 years before the blast-off of Sputnik I.

Although best-known for his science-fiction, Bradbury has authored many "slick" stories for Saturday Evening Post, Mademoiselle, Cosmopolitan, Esquire and other national magazines. His two books, "The October Country" and "Dandelion Wine" are both collections of his diversified short fiction.

Bradbury's versatility extends to the television and motion-picture fields; one of his best-known scripts being the film version of "Moby Dick," which he co-authored with Director John Huston. He will be presented at the meeting by program chairman Catherine Pitt Bolton.

Southwest Manuscripters is open to both beginning and professional writers, according to Ray Banks, president. The meetings, followed by a coffee hour, take place the third Friday of each month.

### X-Ray Truck Spends Final Week in Area

Final week of the County Health Department's mobile chest x-ray program in the Torrance health district starts Monday when the big green truck moves to Redondo Beach where it will be stationed at 100 El Paseo, Monday and Tuesday, according to Dr. E. A. Kogan, district health officer.

Located at the Redondo Beach Health Center, 217 Beryl St., Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, the truck will be open the following hours: 1 to 7 p.m. Thursday, and 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Wednesday and Friday.

The County Health Department furnishes opportunities for the public to have chest x-rays in most districts of its jurisdiction, Dr. Kogan pointed out. "With this final week of the program in this area going up, we strongly urge persons who have not had an x-ray in the past year to take advantage of this opportunity.

"There is no charge for this service," he said. "Reports are confidential; it takes but a minute and the x-ray is one of the methods used in diagnosing tumors and enlarged heart, in addition to tuberculosis."

Hostesses assisting in registration at the Mobile Unit are from the BPOE Dens of Redondo Beach, and the Redondo Beach Dianas. The Parent-Teacher Associations of the Newton, Walteria and Hildebrand schools, and the Women's Club of Redondo Beach have also furnished assistance in registering for the x-rays.

### Portuguese Bend Riding Club Wins At State Fair

Portuguese Bend Riding Club made an excellent showing at the California State Fair in Sacramento early this month with winning entries in several categories.

"Rose Lee Highland," five-gaited mare owned by Miss Alison Proya of Rolling Hills, came in second in both the mare class and the Stake.

Mrs. Ray Patchin's "Captain Cook" topped the ladies class and was second in the Stake. Ottawa's Resurrection took first place in the children's three-gaited class.

Callaway Coed owned by Miss Kit Neacy of Palos Verdes Estates came in second in the children's three-gaited class, fourth in the amateur class, and third in the Stake.

My Utmost, California-bred green hunter owned by Mrs. Richard Glascock of Palos Verdes Estates, won fifth in the open green hunters and sixth in the California-bred green hunter futurity.

### Your Park Department

Before we return to the subject of trees, we would like to speak about lawns, since so many people have asked us about lawns and how to prepare them. The first step to consider is soil preparation. If your soil is alkaline, gypsum should be worked in, using about 25 to 50 lbs. to 1000 sq. ft. If your soil is acid, apply lime instead of gypsum, using the same proportions, thirty-five to fifty pounds to one thousand square feet. It has been found that grass will grow in most all soils if maintained properly. Lawns can be sown in any month in California, but the best time is in the spring or fall—spring for a fast lawn, fall for the better, more hardy lawn. In the fall we have the benefit of winter rains but we may be hit by cold weather, which will hold your grass in an immature state until the warm spring weather brings it out. Again, in preparing the soil, the first two to five inches of top soil should be removed and put in a pile to one side. Next grade in your gypsum or lime from six to eight inches. This soil should be broken up thoroughly. If your soil is sandy, add well rotted manure or peat moss. To get better drainage, add some small gravel or wood ashes. When this is broken up thoroughly you are ready for that layer of top soil you removed. Add an equal amount of humus, the best humus being that taken from mushroom beds. If this is not available, use well rotted pulverized manure. Wet this down and so all manure has weed seeds they should be allowed to sprout and then removed twice before the grass seed is sown. The manure or bonus should be spread on about one to two inches thick, and then should be raked in about three inches deep. After this is done be sure that enough time has lapsed for weed seeds to sprout and be removed. Now the soil should be raked, leveled, and rolled. Next spread a good commercial fertilizer over the area, about 25 pounds to 1000 square feet. The grass seed should be sowed, seed and fertilizer raked in together, and the soil then watered thoroughly and kept moist. Don't sow too much grass seed—one pound is enough for about 200 square feet. The following mixtures is a good one to use and is used by your Park Department at present:

Meadow fescue	25.00
Kentucky blue	29.45
Red fescue	28.89
Chewing fescue	28.50
White clover	29.84
Poa Trivialis	24.88
Highland East	24.97

After your lawn is established, water regularly; give it three good waterings a week. The moisture should go down to about four inches in depth. As water makes a solution of fertilizer, it should be fertilized about every six weeks. Do not mow your new lawn until grass is about three to four inches long and then set your mower at 2 1/2 inches. Cutting your grass any shorter stops the grass plants from breathing; it also allows the hot sun to dry out the roots. In old established lawns, fertilizers should be given about three times a year—in October, March, and July. Water thoroughly after each feeding.
