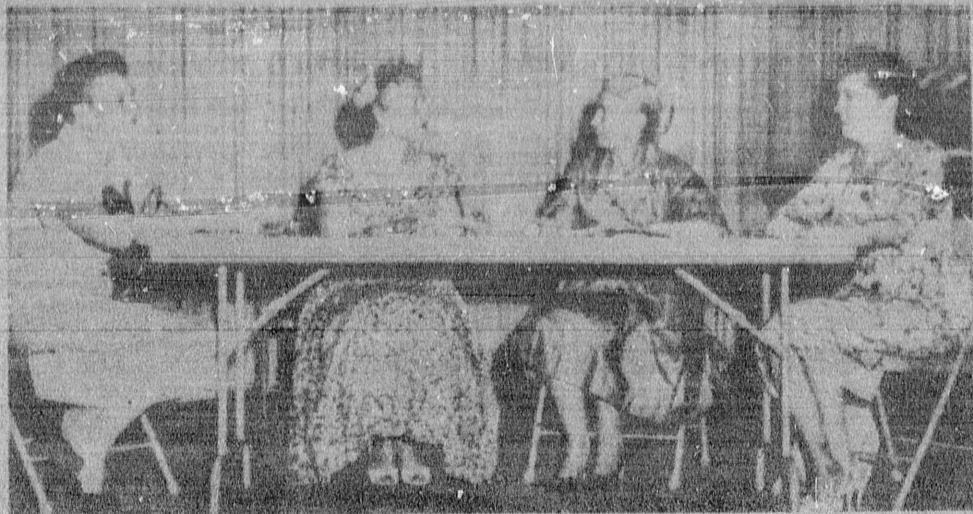


First Marina Conclaves Here
