

## Chest Reports One-Third Ready To Launch Fall Fund Campaign

The 3216 volunteers needed for the Harbor Area Community Chest residential campaign are almost one-third enrolled as of Sept. 18th, was the report made to J. A. Robinson, chairman of the Harbor Welfare Federation Board, at a morning coffee held at the Hacienda Hotel last Friday.

Congratulating them upon this early start for the 1958 campaign to meet emergency needs of the 167 Red Feather agencies, Robinson also presented seven awards to the residential leaders with the highest percentage of recruitment to date.

THE HARBOR area, having been divided into two sections for the residential chest campaign, Mrs. Best Akerson, chairman of the area comprising San Pedro, Wilmington, Gardena and Harbor City, received the award for being 95.66 per cent organized as compared to the 18.22 per cent recruiting record in Torrance, Palos Verdes and Rolling Hills areas headed by Mrs. Patricia Goodwin of the latter.

each of the two parts of the area to the unit chairman, the division chairman and the section chairmen with the highest unit chairman awards went to Mrs. Betty Fields of Rolling Hills and to Warren Low of Lomita.

DIVISION chairman awards were to Mrs. Oia Burrows of Wilmington who reported 120 per cent recruitment in her division and to Mrs. William Leone of Palos Verde who was high with 66.66 per cent enrollment in her division. That there will be keen competition this year between Wilmington and Gardena was evidenced by the fact that Gardena also had a division completely enrolled with 100 per cent but was surpassed by the 120 per cent record of Wilmington.

Mrs. James McNeil of Torrance, who had completely organized her section with the help of members of the Church of the Nativity parish, and Mrs. Grace Whittingham of Wilmington, who had worked with the Wilmington Park School PTA in securing her volunteers, received the section

chairman awards. Robinson, who was Harbor Area Chest campaign chairman of last year's campaign, presided in the absence of Glenn Koger, this year's Chest chairman. He congratulated the workers on their early work in organizing this year, but pointed out that two-thirds of the recruitment yet remained to be done.

"EARLY AND full recruitment is the secret of a successful campaign," said Robinson pointing out that the Harbor Area in achieving 112 per cent of the residential goal last year led all other areas of the Los Angeles Chest, and that if they were to maintain their proud position again this year as the leading residential campaign group, it would be essential that every section chairman enroll 100 per cent of her needed workers by early October.

The individual community ranking and percentage for the 1944 residential organization were: Lomita, 97.46; Rolling Hills, 94.69; Wilmington,

22.86; Palos Verde, 32.55; Gardena, 24.63; and Torrance, 11.07.

THE IFA Kase Trophy for total organization, including commerce and industry, advance gifts, business as well as residential is held by Wilmington Community Chest in the office of City Chest chairman Boyden McIntroy, vice president of Vegetable Oils Products Co.

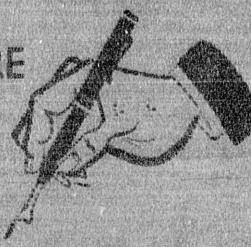
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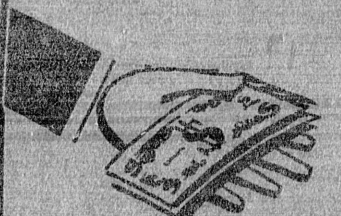
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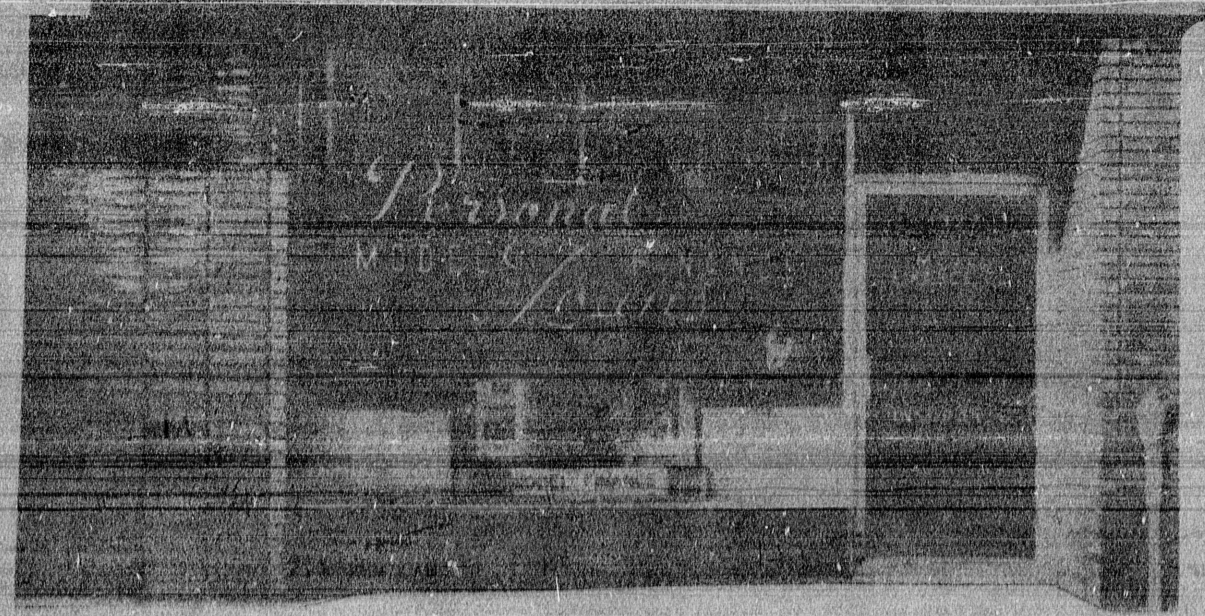
