### Art Sues Stars On Texas Army Basketball Team

As attendants begin dusting off the hardwood floor in preparation for the 1959 basketball season, the Brooke Army Medical Center Comets at Fort Sam Houston, Tex., are counting heavily on the services of "jumpshot" artist Art Sues of 1734 W. 234th St.

The 22-year-old Torrance High School graduate was a key figure in the Comets' strong showing last year, despite an injury suffered early in the season. Sues' teammates included All-Americans Joe Gibbin, Mississippi; John Patzward, Gustavus Adolphus; and Bill Milky, Temple.

That Sues would prove of immeasurable value to the Comets was indicated in his play this past summer. With a team composed of approximately the same aggregate that will work together this year, Sues was high scorer for the team that finished second in the league.

His athletic abilities are not confined to the court. The Brooke Army Medical Center volleyball team won the 4th Army championship with Sues as runner-up for "most valuable player" last year.

The 5-foot 11-inch, 170-pounder lettered in basketball, baseball and football at his high school alma mater. He attended El Camino Junior College in 1954 and was the school's second leading scorer in that year and 1955.

Sues' net achievements won him an athletic scholarship at the University of California at Santa Barbara where he played under the tutelage of Coach Willy Wilton. The physical education major was member of Delta Tau Delta. Presently working in the special services division of headquarters, Brooke Army Medical Center, Sues has one year of athletic eligibility remaining. He has been offered athletic scholarships at Villanova, Temple, and Trinity universities, and try-outs by the professional Philadelphia Warriors and Boston Celtics.
