

Fox to Open Newest Market In North Torrance Thursday

Fox Markets, Inc., Southern California food chain, today announced the grand opening on Oct. 9th of its latest market at 2121 W. 162nd St. This brings the total number of supermarkets in the chain to 40, which have been acquired mainly by purchasing other markets, since the first Fox market was established less than five years ago.

The new market is located in a shopping center, which also contains a drug store, doctor's office, beauty shop, barber shop, dry cleaners, and a fountain snack bar. There is easy-access parking, with space for 300 cars.

This modern new market has 22,000 square feet of floor space, and will carry a full line of domestic and imported fancy foods, including Japanese, Spanish, Mexican, Chinese, and Kosher foods, and has a grocery, delicatessen, meat and frozen foods department, a Van de Kamp bakery, and a completely stocked liquor department. The market also has a kitchenware department, and carries soft goods, cosmetics and drug sundries.
