

# 'Not for Sale' Officials Say of New School Site

"Definitely not for sale," Torrance school officials hung that sign on the Adams school site, 29th and Arlington Ave., this week and declared that they'd like to have a long talk with an alleged real estate investor who made the school switchboard light up like a Christmas tree.

Several residents of the area reportedly have been contacted by a man who says he is a real estate investor

buying the site for a giant apartment development. He allegedly told residents that the school district is selling the site secretly.

**IF ANY REAL** estate developer is buying land in the area, the Adams School site is not part of it, Superintendent J. H. Hull declared. Final plans for the school now are being completed, he said. Construction is slated to start

by next spring, providing Torrance voters make enough school bond money available at a special election on October 14.

The school, which will relieve double session problems nearby, will contain 10 classrooms. It would be part of the program of building financed which would be financed by the \$15,000,000 bond issue which will come before the voters.

Meanwhile, school officials would like to find the man who claims he is buying the site and let him talk to some of the unhappy residents who called to check on the rumor.

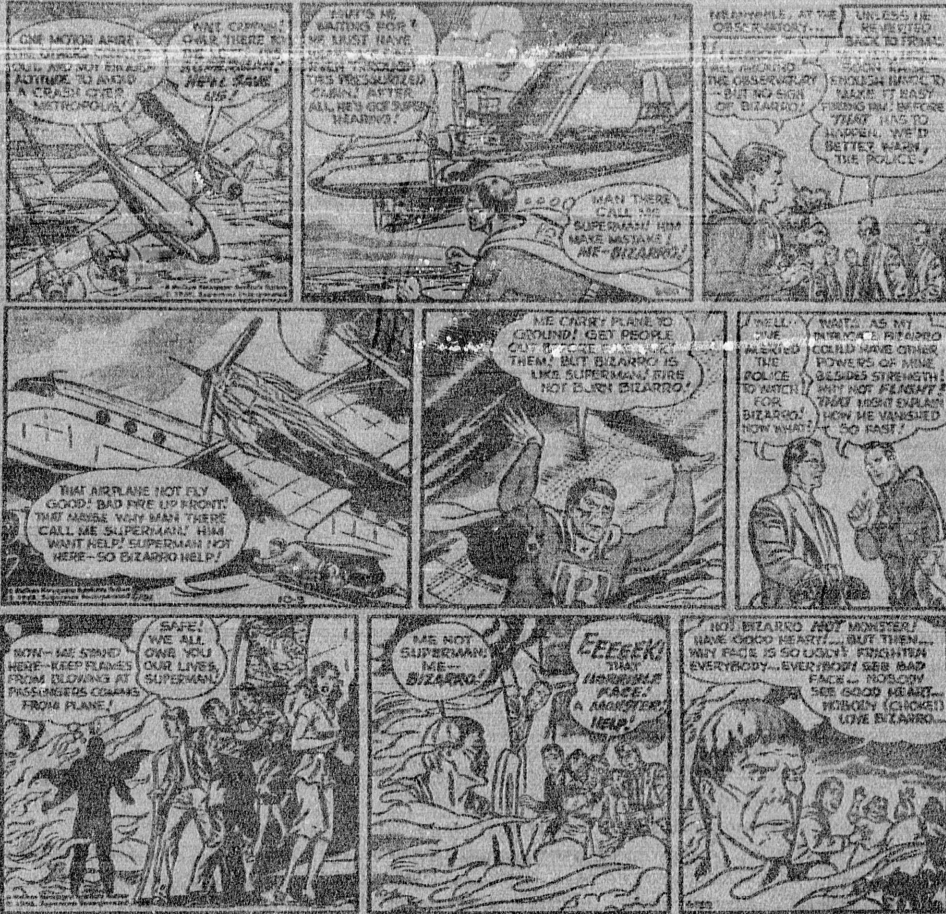
