- HAM LOAF**
- 1 1/2 lb. smoked ham
  - 1 lb. fresh pork
  - 1 c. cracker crumbs
  - 1 small onion (chopped)
  - Grind ham and pork together. Add other ingredients. Mold and put in loaf size casserole. Bake one hour at 325 degrees. Twenty minutes before removing from oven make a mixture of: 1 cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, and 3 tablespoons vinegar. Pour this mixture over ham loaf. Serves 6 to 8 persons.
- FROZEN ANGEL FOOD**
- 1 pt. whipped cream
  - 1 c. powdered sugar
  - 3 egg whites (stiffly beaten)
  - 1/2 tsp. vanilla
  - 1 c. drained, crushed pineapple
  - Fold ingredients together and pack in freezer trays.
