Sheriff's Deputies Back Move For Better Jails

Overcrowded facilities in the county jail are responsible for a grass-roots campaign launched by a speakers bureau of sheriff's deputies to advise the public to vote for Propositions A, B and C on the November ballot.

Under the leadership of Charles Deck, sheriff's deputies are ringing doorbells and appearing before clubs and organizations throughout the county to describe the conditions resulting from the crowding of 3300 prisoners into facilities built to house 1340 persons.

Groups desiring to obtain speakers from the sheriff's bureau are asked by Deck to contact Captain Hal Marlow, chief of Industrial Relations at the Hall of Justice.

Deck stated that there has been an increase of 320 inmates a year due to the influx of new people to the county since the old central jail facility was built in 1927. Provisions of the three propositions, he pointed out, call for a central jail to be located east of the Union Station near the courts, it would serve in the civic center (Proposition A), a women's facility (Proposition B), and a TB Segregation facility (Proposition C). The women's facility would be located on county-owned land.
