 smaller development. Hoedemaker, whose lease had been tied into development across the street, showed a reluctance to go ahead with a major restaurant project after the shopping center plans were diminished.

A request by Hoedemaker that he be permitted to pay rentals less than those called for in the lease until next April was turned down last week by the council.

SEVERAL OF THE councilmen had expressed disappointment in the Hody development recently when plans submitted for approval showed that the firm wanted to put a service station on the corner, and reduce the restaurant size from that which the council believed

was originally planned. Hoedemaker thanked the councilmen for their work on the project, saying "You have been very kind to us, and we assure you it is greatly appreciated."

He asked the council to prepare the documents necessary to terminate the three-year-old lease and forward them to his firm so the matter could be closed.

The council will consider his announcement Tuesday at their 8 p.m. meeting.

Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony Opens Flavio Beauty Firm

Official opening of Flavio's College of Beauty at Cravens and Gramercy was celebrated this week with Mayor Albert Isen and Postmaster Clara Conner cutting the ribbon to herald its first day of business. Flavio, with many years of experience in the profession, is known as an author and lecturer as well as an instructor. The new establishment occupies the downtown Torrance building which formerly was the office of the California State Employment Service adjacent to the HERALD Building. Flavio has expended more than \$25,000 in remodeling and furnishing the building to accommodate students enrolling at the college. The school, in addition to offering instruction in the profession, provides hair services to the public by the students under the strict supervision of the instructors. Instruction is designed to qualify the student for licensing by the State of California, and includes courses ranging from beginning classes to advanced and professional students who wish to refresh their skills.  month. The others will open later in the year. Bonds are the legal method provided by the state for financing school construction. Because of the tremendous growth of Torrance in the past few years (12,000 to nearly 100,000) the district has had to obtain state loan funds in addition to its regular bond funds. The district must, however, remain bonded to capacity if it is to remain eligible for state aid. The last of the bond funds authorized by the voters in 1933 has been allotted and the district will have to have more available bond funds to get more state aid.

A COMMITTEE of 50 leading citizens has actively supported the bond issue. It has been endorsed by the Torrance Chamber of Commerce; Downtown Retail Merchants; Torrance Industries Tax Committee; United Stevedockers of America Local 1314; Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Local 1-519 and 1-120; Torrance Ministerial Assn; the Torrance Citizens for Better Schools; and the Walleria Businessmen's Assn.
