**BEEF STROGONOFF**  
1 lb. hamburger  
1 med. onion (chopped)  
1 garlic (chopped)  
1 can. sour cream  
2 tsp. flour  
Brown hamburger, onions and garlic. Add flour, stir and cook over low heat about five minutes. Add mushrooms and soup, heat through, and just before serving add sour cream. Serve over noodles or rice.

**LEMON MERINGUE PIE**  
Combine 3 tbsp. cornstarch and 1 cup sugar plus 2 tbsp. water in top of double boiler. Add grated rind of 1 lemon, 4 tsp. lemon juice, 1 tsp. butter, and 3 egg yolks, beaten. Mix well, then add 1 1/2 cups boiling water slowly. Cook over hot water until thick. Cool. Pour into baked pastry shell. Beat three egg whites until almost stiff, then add 6 tsp. sugar while continuing to beat until stiff. Arrange on pie and bake in a slow oven 300 F. for 30 minutes.
