

15 Million School Bond Issue Wins by 8-1 Margin

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10,000 Ballots Cast on Bonds


More than 10,000 voters, or 30 per cent of those eligible, kept the bond election record of the Torrance school system unbroken here Tuesday by voting nearly 8 to 1 in favor of a \$15,000,000 bond issue. Final unofficial tally showed 9328 voting "Yes," and 1335 voting "No."

Voting was especially heavy in the newer sections of the city which expect new schools or where additions to existing schools are contemplated. It was lightest in the older sections of town where the school population has diminished. The downtown Torrance residents voting at the old city hall was the only precinct failing to give the proposal the necessary two-thirds majority.

In contrast, the Casimir precinct recorded nearly 15 to 1 for the bonds, Flavian nearly 23 to 1, and Hillside nearly 14 to 1.
