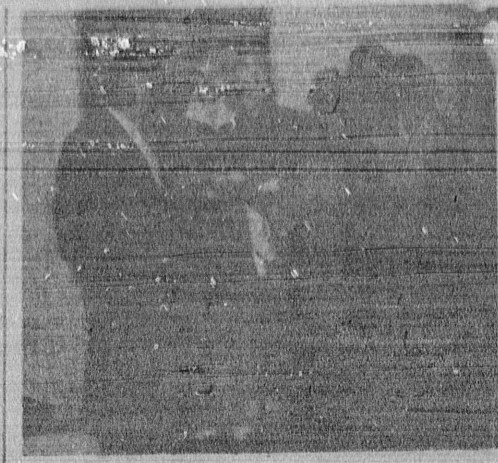
Mrs. Hazel James of Long Beach will speak on "Dahlias and Chrysanthemums."
