ECC Warriors Drop Third Grid Battle

Out to regain their traditional status as a Metropolitan Conference powerhouse, the Warriors of El Camino College travel to Santa Monica City College Friday night to go battle with the undefeated Pirates in an 8 p.m. tilt. History generally favors the Warriors, who have

been pummeled out of the playoffs in seven of the teams' 11 past conflicts. Recent history, however, gives a strong nod to the San Monicans, who have overpowered Ventura College and San Diego last year's Metro winners—in their two outings.

The Warriors, on the other hand, have emerged red-faced from two of three encounters. Although they swept by Ventura College in the season opener, the Warriors suffered losses to Modesto and Santa Monica recently, in Valley College.

Both the Valley Monarchs and the Warriors displayed something less than their usual brand of ball in Saturday night's fray.

Valley's passing attack was let by a second-string quarterback, Bob Alfred, who pitched two touchdowns to Fred Tunnichiffe for 88 yards in the first quarter and one to Ed Sander for 15 yards in the final 10 seconds of the game. Jerry Steele, first string quarterback, was general when the running attack was moving.

The 51 and 38-yard runs by Bob Wilson and Denny Nodine, the passing of Alfred and jugging Warrior tackling added to the joys of the Monarch offense.

Speed displayed by Valley backs overshadowed that of the locals. Denny Nodine's 38-yard run was accompanied by a score reverse that caught the ECC right end so far out of position that spectators were led to observe that the Warriors were playing only 10 men.

Scoring started with three minutes gone in the game. Valencia was in punt formation for the Warriors. An overhead center brought a horde of tacklers on Valencia in the end zone for a safety, giving the Monarchs a 2 to 0 lead.

Valencia punted from the El Camino 20-yard line to the Valley 37, from which Pete Holt returned the ball to the ECC 45. On the second down, Nodine went for 33 yards on a fourth attempt and ran past later Steele rolled out around right end for a touchdown, giving Valley an 8-0 lead.

SPARKED BY a 51-yard run by Bob Wilson, Valley scored again on a pass by Alfred to Tunnichiffe for 38 yards. The extra points were made on Dick Santa's run. The score, with only 13 minutes gone in the first quarter, was 18 to 0.

El Camino received the ball and was forced to punt. With Valley in charge, it was fourth and one. Wayne Atkins, showing real defensive spark, made a vicious tackle on Nodine, holding him to no gain as the Warriors took possession.

Atkins' effort was futile, however, as Lynn Hoyem, attempting to lateral to Tony Pallante, fumbled. Valley took over on its own 48 and displayed a 52-yard drive climaxized by a play on which Santa scored from 15 yards out. Santa's run accounted for the extra points and the halftime score registered 24 for Valley and 0 for El Camino.

UNLIKE THE Modesto second-half performance, the Warrior return demonstrated re-energization, and two successful scoring attempts. In the third quarter, Bruce Seifert
