## New El Nido Phone Plant Announced

General Telephone has announced plans to construct a new one-story, reinforced concrete central office building on 190th St. east of Inglewood Ave. in the El Nido area, according to H. C. Vaupel, manager of the Frontier number area. "It will be known as the El Nido central office," he said, "and will serve subscribers in the eastern sector of the Redondo exchange area."

When completed the new central office will serve initially about 4000 subscribers, with facilities to accommodate up to 1000 additional subscribers without further installations being required.

Vaupel said that the entire project will cost an estimated \$1,923,000.

The El Nido central office is set up to cut into service in October 1958.

## Brownie Troop 25

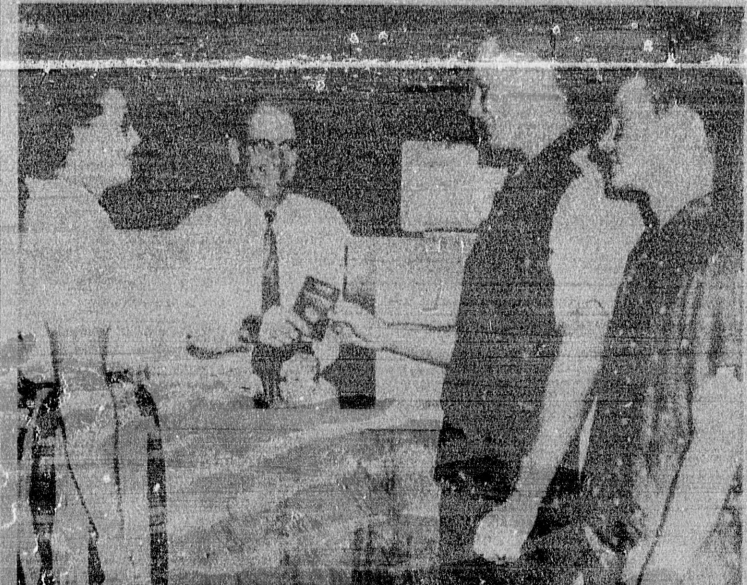

## Knight Football Teams Wins First Game Thursday

The Knights of Bishop Montgomery chalked up their first gridiron victory in the history of the school as they beat the experienced Mary Star of the Sea eleven in an impressive 13-to-0 win last Thursday on the Montgomery field.

The first score was made in the second quarter when the Knights drove 40 yards in 12 plays with Jack Gordon making the touchdown from the one-yard line. The try for the extra point failed.

The Knights threatened several times in the third quarter, but in the fourth Bob Early returned a punt 40 yards and the Knights drove 33 yards in five plays, climaxing by a nine-yard pass by Joe Rutherford for the second touchdown. Rutherford also made the extra point.

Mary Star made only 24 yards and never penetrated deeper than the Knights' 25-yard line. The Knights piled up 253 yards. Two fumbles were recovered, three interceptions made, and one punt blocked by the Knight defense.

Coach Gompert said, "Today represented our best team effort. Our defensive achievement was outstanding. Boys such as Joe Young, Pedro de la Cruz and Harvey Poorhold played the outstanding game they are capable of playing. Our offense was also improved, led by such boys as Joe Rutherford, Dick Moore and Dick Corwin."

The Knights play again next Thursday at Montgomery.
